A National CND march and rally will hit London on Saturday October 24th. Those that all members of Exeter CND will be there together with friends, family, banners and pets(!)

The plan is for everybody to assemble on VICTORIA EMBANKHENT between 10.00 a.m. and 12.00 midday. Between these times, the various regional groups will set off for HYDE PARK. The South West regional group will leave at 11.30 a.m.

TRANSPORT

A choice of transport is available on Cotober 24th.

(i) By Train: Tickets -£6 return for adults & £4.50 return for children.

Leave London 6.10 p.m.

(ii) By Coach: Tickets - £4.80 for waged persons and £3.20 for unwaged persons.

Leave Exeter Coach Station 7.00a.m. Leave London 6.30 p.m.

National CND is making massive efforts to re-organise itself to adapt to being the major movement it now is. They are in need of funds, not only to cover the cost of the October Demonstration, but because they have already grown out of the 11, Goodwin St. office and are hoping to find some way of expanding. Those of you who are not already National members as well as local group members, might consider becoming so - if you can afford it - to swell the membership figures (which still don't include local members) as well as the funds. Sanity has improved out of all recognition and we are increasing our order, so there should be plenty in the shop from October onwards.

A sub-committee has submitted a report to National Council proposing changes that would make CND more representative and encourage devolution of funds and organisation. It also proposes that 'Area' campaigns be promoted within the regions and that National Council should be held quarterly and extended to include Area representation (5 per region). A good example of a developing Area campaign is the increasing cooperation between East Devon Exmouth, Exeter and Chagford which is proving mutually beneficial.

The Schumacher Society lectures this year have as their theme 'Peace is possible'. They will take place inBristol University Union on 7th November. Tickets at £2 or £3. Details available from the GND shop.

Letter from Edward Thompson, August 1st:

"Just a line to say how much I enjoyed Saturday and how honoured I was to be made 1,000th member. I didn't really have a chance to tell you what a fantastic achievement it is to have got to the 1,000 figure. You must be one of the first, if not the first, place outside the three or four great cities that has done this. Let's hope other places follow your example."

We had a series of bland replies from the B.B.C. to letters written about their treatment of "our 1,000th member" in relation to the Dimbleby Lecture, apologising for an administrative error and assuring us that there had been no external pressure.

On a personal note: I returned from a welcome holiday to find, to my great delight, (but no surprise) that Exeter CND had run quite happily thank you without me! Thanks to all concerned, particularly Janet, Graham, Walter and Barry. An increasing number of people are coming forward not just to help, but to take responsibility.

On October 1st, I shall be leaving Exeter for E. Berlin, as a member of Women for World Disarmament whose founder President, Mrs Tacclin-Morris is taking a small party of women to the G.D.R. We shall be attending some official functions, but most of our time will be spent talking to women in E. Berlin, Weimar and Dresden, building friendships and making links. I have already met some of our hosts at a U.N.A. reception hare in Exeter and know them to have a very real concern for peace. On the 8th, Mrs Tacclin-Morris and I go to Prague to an International Women's Conference on Disarmament. I hope to make a full report of my visits in the November Newsletter.

LUXULYAN

Luxulyan is one of three sites being considered for the building of a nuclear power station in Cornwall. Nanskuke and Gwithian are the other two sites and all exploratory work has beencompleted at both sites.

On 13th May a recently formed action group - Luxulyan Against Nuclear Development (L.A.N.D.) - took over the site to prevent the exploratory drilling of the CEGB. The occupation is now in its 18th week.

Just recently L.A.N.D. won a great victory in court when the CEGB were trying to force the police to move them off. The judge ruled that since the occupation was both peaceful and legal there were no reasonable grounds on which to serve such an order. The CEGB have appealed the decision. Since there are now questions of civil liberties involved the appeal is to go before the highest appeal court in the land, bar the House of Lords. However, it could well end up there if the CEGBlose the first appeal and appeal again.

If CEGB win in the House of Lords it means changing the law to give them greater powers which will involve L.A.N.D. in a wider campaign.

Remember that if this power station is built, highly radioactive and dangerous waste will be transported through the DEvon area by rail. This is apart from the close relationship between nuclear power and nuclear weaponry.

L.A.N.D. are now producing a newsletter and printing badges, posters etc. to inform and to raise money but this costs money. So please give if you can to the Anti-Nuclear Caravan, Lower Menadue Farm, Luxulyan, Cornwall. Also please go down if you can. They have camping facilities and you can call ahead to Lanivet 205 or St. Austell 850079.

Members of all the area groups of CND in the region managed to provide a continuous vigil at the Nagasaki cherry tree behind Dingles throughout Saturday August 8th in remembrance of the victims of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki nuclear bombs. Members of Christian CND used the occasion to unfurl their very splendid banner for the first time and there was a good turnout at 11.00 a.m. to start the vigil. The muffled peal of bells of St. Petroc further added to the occasion. A Japanese tourist who happened the vigil in the morning returned in the afternoon accompanied by his large family and he took many photographs of what obviously seemed to him to be a note-worthy occasion. He was unable to express adequately his feelings in English but he clearly was moved. The focal point of the vigil, the cherry tree, is regrettably rather overshadowed by more vigorous shrubs and its little plaque quite hidden. The Council must be made aware of its existence and be encouraged to nurture it. The occasion probably would have benefited from the distribution of a leaflet. Many people were interested and impressed by the vigil and might well have joined us had they had more information.

We now have £1,500 in our accounts, most of which should be spent, and hopefully recovered, on the events happening in October. Following discussions with our Tax Inspector, it appears that we are liable as an "unincorporated association", to 40% Corporation tax on taxable profits (i.e. sum of income over expenditure) in any year (January to October). Donations are tax free, but the Inspector won't give a decision as to whether membership subscriptions are until after our first accounts are presented in January 1982. Our expenditure will therefore have to be arranged so that all our "profit" for 1981 is composed of donations to ensure that we don't pay tax this year.


Neutron Bomb Meeting
